Present: Mayor Rusty Nix, Council Member David King, Council Member Lelia Mitchell, Council Member Kenneth Dukes, Council Member Martha Eisenberg, Council Member Sonya Swords. Quorum present.

Work Session called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Mayor Nix with Quorum present.

Mayor Nix called for Discussion of New Business Items on Agenda:

Mayor Nix Called for Committee Reports:

Mayor Nix called on Council Member King for Public Health & Safety: Council Member King called on Chief Littleton for the Police Department report. Chief Littleton reported there were 93 Total Cases in January. Chief Littleton commented on the shooting incident Saturday night. See Appendix 1.

Council Member King called on Chief Davis for the Fire Department Report. Chief Davis reported there were 99 Total Calls for the month of January. See Appendix 2.

Council Member King reported Planning and Zoning Commission will meet at 6 p.m. on Thursday in Council Chamber and meeting is open to the public.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Dukes for the Sustainability Report. Council Member Dukes called on Kirk Hamby, Head of Public Works. Kirk reported on the progress at the Warehouse/ Recycling Center. He reported fencing has been installed at the Malher House for construction site work. He invited everyone to Arbor Day being held at the Recycling Center on February 25th from 9 a.m. – 1 p.m.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Eisenberg for Recreation, Preservation and Community Development. Council Member Eisenberg called on Shane Baugh, Parks and Recreation Director. Shane reported registration for soccer was the largest ever. First high school baseball game is this Saturday. Trail maintenance day at Shoal Creek Park is this Saturday in partnership with Engage Alabama, students from University of Alabama coming in for project. High school visitors side bleachers are in need of replacement and the cost would be \$140,000 to replace.

Mayor Nix reported Senior Soup and Bingo would be held at 10:30 a.m. this Saturday at the Senior Center.

Mayor Nix called for the Education, Arts and Outreach Committee Reports. Council Member Mitchell called on Savannah Kitchens Director of Parnell Memorial Library. Savannah reported the March calendar of events for the Library are online and social media; the Library has 18 Programs running; Library will be closed February 18th – 20th for Presidents Day Holiday. See Appendix 3.

Council Member Mitchell called on Sarah Hogan, IMPACT Montevallo. Sarah reported IMPACT has been asked to present the "Gas Station Drugs" to the Alabama School Counselors Association; She reported on the "Hidden in Plain Sight Trailer" and has presented quotes to City Clerk Steve Gilbert. This would allow the trailer to be outfitted to look like a bedroom and teach parents and educators how to search for stash items; a vehicle is needed to haul the trailer and asked if anyone knows how to obtain a vehicle to let her know. No written report was submitted.

Council Member Mitchell called on Julia Smith, Mayor, Montevallo Junior City Council (MJCC). Julia reported the MJCC met on February 6^{th,} and they are working on a 10 year recruitment video; she thanked Council Member Swords for allowing the MJCC to buy a snow cone machine so they will be able to sell cotton candy and snow cones as fundraisers.

Council Member Mitchell gave the January report for the Boys and Girls Club: they now have two UM Falcon Scholars; Youth of the Month is Connor Rooks. See Appendix 6.

Council Member Mitchell reported schools will be closed on February 20th.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Swords for Finance, Economic Development & Tourism. Council Member Swords called on Courtney Bennett, Executive Director of Montevallo Main Street. Courtney reported the arbor project has been completed at the post office; Spring 2023 CO.STARTERS is now live for entrepreneurs and new business owners; Sustainability Committee will host a cleanup at Orr Park from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. and reported anyone interested in invited. His favorite hobby is playing soccer, and his favorite thing about the club is getting to see all of the friends he has in his group, the Monkeys!










CO.STARTERS Core is a three-month, cohort-based program that equips entrepreneurs of all kinds with the insights, relationships, and tools needed to turn business ideas into action. The only real prerequisites to joining the program are (1) having an idea, (2) being willing to question, shape and fine-tune that idea, and (3) being willing to talk about the idea with others.

Participants enter into a facilitator-led, collaborative process with a small and supportive group of 10-15 like-minded peers. Working together, participants develop and fine-tune their ideas, critically examining every part and determining next steps through real-time feedback from people in the community, using a simplified version of the Business Model Canvas. This approach enables entrepreneurs to rapidly uncover flaws in their concepts and find viable models more quickly. Participants leave the program with a deeper understanding of how to create a sustainable business, articulate their models, and repeat the process with the next great idea.

Storm shelter roughly 50+ feet long. 9 feet high?. 5 foot?? from outer edge to door opening. pipe opening to get wiring out is about 1 inch with internal threads that may be 3/4 inch or 1 inch (hard to tell from picture). Benches down the sides are 17 inches from floor to bottom of bench. Benches stick away from wall just under 18 inches to outside of bench seat. 38 inches up from the ground (complete guess but within 5 inches). There is a vertical slot in corner metal brace for bench (under very end of bench) that might be used to mount our equipment box to although it looks like it is 4 inches away from wall leaving only 14 or less inches for our equipment box from front to back TOTAL if we mount to it (or even in front of it). Must keep box away from vent to outside to avoid rain splash, moisture, bugs, etc..... On the top of the shelter it is roughly 12 feet from the end of the shelter to the crane hooks on top of the shelter we can use to mount the end of the conduit and WiFi pt-to-pt to shoot toward fire station on the shelter behind the fire station or the Cellular Antennae used on the other shelter. We will need to come up with something to mount these to using the 2-4 inch circular opening (??) used by the crane to pick the shelter up with. Steve believes the grey (but hard) PVC conduit is sufficient for use with the surveillance system. The conduit running the electrical lighting down the shelter is 1/2" metal conduit. It has to take either a 30 degree (estimate - 45 I think is too much but we must match) slant over and then back to offset the conduit and lighting around the bathrooms. We will need to come up with a way to attach our PVC conduit to the existing 1/2" without interfering with the existing lighting. This may limit us to running 1/2" as well just to keep it small enough to fit behind the lights. The good news is that only the conduit going across the length of the ceiling to the far camera needs to be 1/2". The conduit to run outside "might" be bigger or just get bigger to go through hole in shelter. We will need to figure out how to mount the conduit to the outside of the shelter in such a manner to make it impervious to mischief. Before running conduit anywhere, double check how the power is getting out to the lights above the door on the front of the shelter ... could we use this same opening to get our ethernet for WiFi or Cellular antennae wire out?
